The secluded fishing village of Naufragados Beach is only accessible by a one hour hike, or by fishermen's boats.



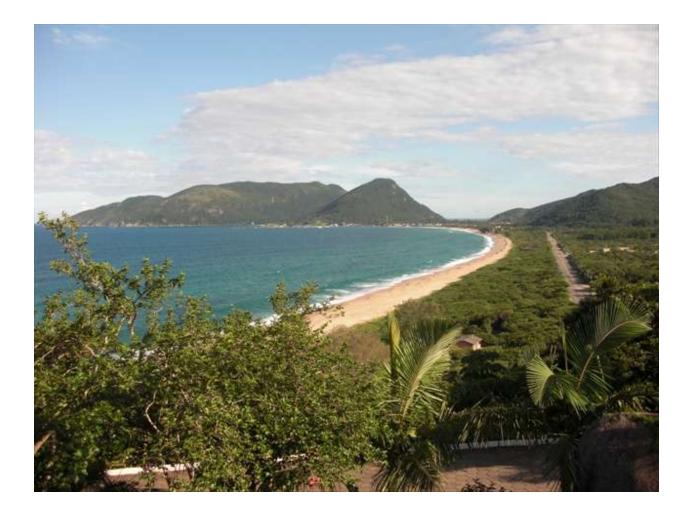
Arriving by water taxi at the isolated Azorean community of Costa da Lagoa is enchanting.
